Epidemiology & public health





The History and Purpose of the Cambridge Seminar




Established in 1981 to provide training in epidemiological methods for diabetes mellitus. Resident international expert Faculty and participants from all over the world



PROFESSOR Mohan Munasinghe (1964) was co-recipient of the 2007 Nobel Peace Prize in his capacity as Vice Chairman of the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

The IPCC shared the prize with environmental campaigner and former US Vice-President Al Gore.


The prize citation praised the PCC for its efforts to build up and disseminate greater knowledge about man-made climate change, and to lay the foundations for the measures that are needed to counteract such change?

Professor Munasinghe will deliver the annual Clare Distinguished Lecture in Economics and Public Policy on 14 May 2008, on the economics of climate change.




